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### CONCEPTUAL REVIEW OF SWOT ANALYSIS FOR SUSTAINABILITY OF BUSINESS OPERATING IN DYNAMIC ENVIRONMENT

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#### **ABSTRACT**

For economic growth and development of any nation, business enterprise is a key player and therefore for it to be sustainable, certain factors, forces that are components of business environment have to be taken into cognizance. The analysis of the forces (business environmental components; internal and external) has to do with an analysis of the environment in which a firm or an enterprise exists in terms of opportunities and threats operating in the external environment in conjunction with the strengths and weaknesses environment. The existing internal external environment variables(Opportunities and Threats) that are outside the organization and not typically within the short-run control of top management. These variables form the context within which the corporation exists. The internal environment of a corporation consist of variables (Strengths and Weakness) that are within the organization itself and are not usually within the short run control of top management. These variables form the context in which work is done. They include the corporation's structure, culture, and resources. Thus, for business to keep abreast of the opportunities, the threats, the strengths and the weakness, it is highly imperative that business environment is critically examined, assessed, scanned, and thereafter, strategies needed to be adopted so as for business to thrive well efficiently and effectively in the dynamic environment-through application of SWOT analysis.

#### INTRODUCTION

In general, an effective strategy is one that takes advantage of the organization's opportunities by employing its strengths and wards off threats by avoiding them or by correcting or compensating for weaknesses. SWOT analysis is a precursor to strategic planning and is performed by a panel of experts who can assess the organization from a critical perspective (Gibis. B. Artiles, J. Corabian, P. Meiesaar, K. Koppel, A. Jacobs, P. Serrano, P. and Menon, D).

SWOT is an acronym and it stands for "strengths, weaknesses, opportunities and threats". It is an instrumental framework which is used to identify and evaluate the external value-creating (destroying) factors and the internal value-creating (destroying) factors in value-based management and strategy formulation (Value-Based Management, 2010).

The first part of any SWOT analysis is to collect a set of key facts about the organization and its environment. This will include facts about the organization's markets, competition, financial resources, facilities, employees, inventories, marketing and distribution system, R&D, management, environmental setting (e.g. Technological, political, social, and economic trends), history and reputation.

The second part of a SWOT analysis is to evaluate data to determine whether they constitute strengths, weaknesses, opportunities or threats for the organization. This may be done independently by the individuals in a group, results being compared afterwards. It is important to note that any given fact may give rise to more than one evaluation, and so to ask - "How may this fact be considered as an opportunity as well as a threat?"; "How may

this apparent strength turn out to be a weakness?"; "How does this weakness really represent a strength?" The answers to these and similar questions may give managers new insights into choosing appropriate strategies (Rowe, Mason, Dickel, Mann, and Mockler 1994).

#### **Conceptual Review of SWOT Analysis**

The SWOT analysis is also called a TOWS matrix (Weihrich, 1999) or a WOTS-UP analysis (Rowe, Mason, Dickel, Mann and Mockler, 1994), and is a tool of situation analysis often used for strategic decision making (Thompson and Strickland, 1998). Rowe et al. (1994) state that a SWOT analysis helps find the best match between environmental trends (opportunities threats) and internal capabilities and weaknesses). They also (strengths provide the following definitions for the components of a SWOT analysis:

- A strength is a resource or capacity the organization can use effectively to achieve its objectives.
- A weakness is a limitation, fault, or defect in the organization that will keep it from achieving its objectives.
- An opportunity is any favorable situation in the organization's environment. It is usually a trend or change of some kind or an overlooked need that increases demand for a product

- or service and permits the firm to enhance its position by supplying it.
- A threat is any unfavorable situation in the organization's environment that is potentially damaging to its strategy. The threat may be a barrier, a constraint, or anything external that might cause problems, damage or injury.

understanding of An the external environment in terms of opportunities and threats, and the internal environment in terms of strengths and weaknesses is crucial for the existence, growth and profitability of any business organization. A systematic approach to understanding environment is the SWOT analysis. SWOT analysis enables business firms to match the strengths and weaknesses existing in the organizations with opportunities and threats operating in the external environment in order to formulate effective strategies. An effective business strategy, therefore, is one that capitalizes on the opportunities through the use of strengths and minimizes the impact of the threats by taking necessary steps to overcome the weaknesses (Rowe et al. 1994)

SWOT analysis is a planning tool that, when used properly, provides an overall view of the most important factors influencing the future of the program. The SWOT analysis is the foundation for a reflective selfassessment of how your unit is performing its mission. The SWOT analysis results the basis for developing from recommendations and action plans, also known as Quality Improvement Plans (QIPs). These recommendations and action plans take into consideration many different internal and external factors that maximize the potential of the program's strengths and opportunities, while minimizing the impact of its weaknesses and threats. This approach can help ensure efficient use of resources to provide beneficial program outcomes. A SWOT analysis enables proactive thinking rather than habitual or instinctive reactions (http://www.austincc.edu/oiepub/services/s wot.html)

A SWOT analysis is a subjective assessment of data that is organized into a four-dimensional SWOT matrix, similar to a basic two-heading list of pros and cons.

To develop initiatives (strategies) that take into account the SWOT profile, unit members can translate the four lists into a matrix (see above) that associates strengths (maintain, build and leverage), opportunities (prioritize and optimize), weaknesses (remedy), and threats (counter) into actions that can be agreed and owned by the unit (Retrieved from: http://www.austincc.edu/oiepub/services/sw ot.html)

SWOT is a technique for analyzing the internal and external environments of an organization through the identification and assessment of its strengths, weaknesses, opportunities, and threats (SWOT). SWOT analysis entails a distillation of the findings

of an internal and external audit that draws attention, from a strategic perspective, to the critical organizational strengths and weaknesses and the opportunities and threats facing the organization (Kotler and Armstrong, 2011).

The SWOT analysis is also referred to as the TOWS Matrix-this naming is perhaps more suitable when it forms part of an environmental analysis! Rowe, et al, (1994) call it a WOTS-up analysis and offer suggested actions for each matrix segment. With either name it is a systematic method for matching environmental threats and opportunities with the organization's strengths and weaknesses. There is a tendency when doing a SWOT analysis to

be less than honest in the appraisals and to feel the need to cover up feared weaknesses by proclaiming perceived strength. As well as analyzing the environment, it can be used to generate strategic options, so it also forms part of the Strategic Choice element. SWOT may offer its best service at warning of the need for avoidance and so the results may tend to the negative in bias. Although it is future oriented, it does not build in any mechanisms for handling the uncertainty of the future, nor does it give any holistic model of the organization and is not aimed at option evaluation and, hence, nor selection. However, the process of going through an internal and external appraisal may cause the objectives, and hence also the performance measures, to be reviewed.

#### **Benefits of SWOT Analysis**

A SWOT analysis is a simple, but powerful, framework for leveraging the unit's strengths, improving weaknesses, minimizing threats, and taking the greatest possible advantage of opportunities.

SWOT Analyses have several benefits as:

- Opportunity for collaboration on strategic plan formulation
- Incorporates many different internal and external factors
- Structured process that allows for a thorough idea gathering

- The posting of the ideas vs. the yelling minimizes the reactionary processing and group mentality from occurring
- Participants who may traditionally be quiet and participate less, are encouraged, and have the ability to participate in a process which is friendlier to their needs
- Allows the ability for "dominators"
   (overly vocal participants) of the process to be equalized -- but not eliminated

Responses are prioritized within each category, by importance, giving units a clearer understanding of their most pertinent topics and areas to address (http://www.austincc.edu/oiepub/services/s wot.html)

#### **Uses of SWOT Analysis**

- I. The SWOT analysis is an extremely useful tool for understanding and decision -making for all sorts of situations in business and organizations (both profit and non-profit).
- II. SWOT analysis helps in analyzing business and environmental factors
- III. SWOT helps in settings objectives
- IV. SWOT analysis helps marketers to focus especially, on their relative

competitive strengths and weaknesses

- V. SWOT analysis makes marketing managers to examine each competitor's cost structure, sources of profits, resources, competencies, competitive positioning and product differentiation
- VI. SWOT analysis is a tool used in management as strategic planning vi.SWOT analysis works well in brainstorming meetings
- VII. SWOT analysis is used for business planning, strategic planning, competitors' valuation, market research and product development and research reports (NOUN, 2012)

#### **Constituent of SWOT Analysis**

**Strength:** Is an inherent capacity which an organization can use to gain strategic advantages. An example is the possession of superior research and development skills which can be used for new product development; patents rights

Weakness: An inherent limitation or constraint which creates strategic disadvantages. Examples are; over dependence on a single product-line which is potentially risk for a company I times of crises, lack of marketing expertise.

**Opportunity:** A favorable condition in the organization's environment which enables it to consolidate and strengthen its position.

Examples are: the growing demand for a company's product or service, mergers, joint ventures.

**Threat:** An unfavorable condition in the organization's environment which creates a risk, or causes damage to the organization. Examples are; the emergence of strong new competitors that are likely to offer stiff competition to the existing companies in the industry, new regulation, increased trade barriers, etc (NOUN, 2012).

#### **Origin of SWOT Analysis Model**

Justice would not have been done to the explanation of SWOT analysis if its origin is left out. Therefore, information on the origin of SWOT analysis was provided by Albert S. Humphrey. He was one of the founding fathers of SWOT analysis. SWOT analysis emanated from the research conducted at Stamford Research Institute from 1960-1970 to find out why corporate planning failed. The research was funded by the collaborative efforts of 500 companies, essentially to find out what could be done about the failure of corporate planning. The research team made up of Marion Dosher, Dr Otis Benepe, Albert Humphrey, Robert Steward, and Birger Lie (Albert H, 2005)

#### **Strategies of SWOT Analysis**

#### Maxi- Maxi

In this segment, the organization is playing from its strengths to opportunities and hence the business objectives are generally to reduce internal weaknesses and overcome external threats in order to focus upon this segment. Rowe, Mason, et al, (1994) call this "segment exploit"

#### Mini- Maxi

The strategy appropriate for this segment would be one that minimizes weaknesses and maximizes the opportunities. The opportunity exists but requires strength where the organization currently has aweakness. Without strategic action to remove this weaknesses, the opportunity must go to competitors, Rowe et al, (1994) call this "segment search".

#### Mini- Mini

This strategy for this segment is one that will reduce both the weakness and threat. This is the precarious segment and so organizations should adopt strategies that avoid it. Rowe et al (1994) call this "segment avoid".

#### Maxi- Mini

The indicated strategy for this segment is one that uses the strength of the organization in order to deflect the threat. Care must be taken to avoid unnecessary competitive battles, and strategic options that circumvent the threat are to be preferred. Rowe et al (1994) call this "segment confront".
